Proposal 18-1

A proposed initiated law to authorize and legalize possession, use and cultivation of marijuana products by individuals who are at least 21 years of age and older, and commercial sales of marijuana through state-licensed retailers

This proposal would:

Allow individuals 21 and older to purchase, possess and use marijuana and marijuana-infused edibles, and grow up to 12 marijuana plants for personal consumption.

Impose a 10-ounce limit for marijuana kept at residences and require amounts over 2.5 ounces be secured in locked containers.

Create a state licensing system for marijuana businesses and allow municipalities to ban or restrict them.

Permit retail sales of marijuana and edibles subject to a 10% tax, dedicated to implementation costs, clinical trials, schools, roads, and municipalities where marijuana businesses are located.

Change several current violations for crimes to civil infractions.

Proposal 18-2

A proposed constitutional amendment to establish a commission of citizens with exclusive authority to adopt district boundaries for the Michigan Senate, Michigan House of Representatives and U.S. Congress, every 10 years

This proposed constitutional amendment would:

Create a commission of 13 registered voters randomly selected by the Secretary of

4 each who self-identify as affiliated with the 2 major political parties; and

5 who self-identify as unaffiliated with major political parties.

Prohibit partisan officeholders and candidates, their employees, certain relatives, and lobbyists from serving as commissioners.

Establish new redistricting criteria including geographically compact and contiguous districts of equal population, reflecting Michigan's diverse population and communities of interest. Districts shall not provide disproportionate advantage to political parties or candidates.

Require an appropriation of funds for commission operations and commissioner compensation.

Proposal 18-3

This proposed constitutional amendment would allow a United States citizen who is qualified to vote in Michigan to:

Become automatically registered to vote when applying for, updating or renewing a driver's license or state-issued personal identification card, unless the person declines.

Simultaneously register to vote with proof of residency and obtain a ballot during the 2-week period prior to an election, up to and including Election Day.

Obtain an absent voter ballot without providing a reason.

Cast a straight-ticket vote for all candidates of a particular political party when voting in a partisan general election.

Fowler Public School District Operating Millage Proposal

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its full revenue per pupil foundation allowance and restores millage lost as a result of a reduction required by the Michigan Constitution of 1963.

Shall the currently authorized millage rate limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Fowler Public School District, Clinton County, Michigan, be renewed by 17.9892 mills (\$17.9892 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 7 years, and also be increased by .5 mill (\$0.50 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation), for a period of 7 years, 2020 to 2026, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 18 mills are levied in 2020 is approximately \$234,860 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2019 tax levy and the addition of millage which will be levied only to the extent necessary to restore millage lost as a result of a reduction required by the "Headlee" amendment to the Michigan Constitution of 1963)?

I. Clinton County Regional Education Service Agency Area Career & Technical Education Millage Proposal

(Restoration of Headlee Reduction)

This proposal requests additional millage to permit the continued levy by the intermediate school district of the maximum mills for area career and technical education previously approved by the electors.

Shall the current charter limitation on the annual property tax rate for area career and technical education in Clinton County Regional Education Service Agency, Michigan, be increased by .0464 mill (\$0.0464 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 20 years, 2018 to 2037, inclusive (this increase will allow the intermediate school district to levy the maximum rate of 1 mill previously approved by the electors that has been reduced as required by the Michigan Constitution of 1963); the estimate of the revenue the intermediate school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2018 is approximately \$94,500 from local property taxes authorized herein?

II. Clinton County Regional Education Service Agency Special Education Millage Proposal

(Restoration of Headlee Reduction)

This proposal requests additional millage to permit the continued levy by the intermediate school district of the maximum mills for special education previously approved by the electors.

Shall the limitation on the annual property tax rate for the education of students with a disability in Clinton County Regional Education Service Agency, Michigan, be increased by .0297 mill (\$0.0297 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 7 years, 2018 to 2024, inclusive (this increase will allow the intermediate school district to levy the maximum rate of 2.625 mills previously approved by the electors that has been reduced as required by the Michigan Constitution of 1963); the estimate of the revenue the intermediate school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2018 is approximately \$60,500 from local property taxes authorized
